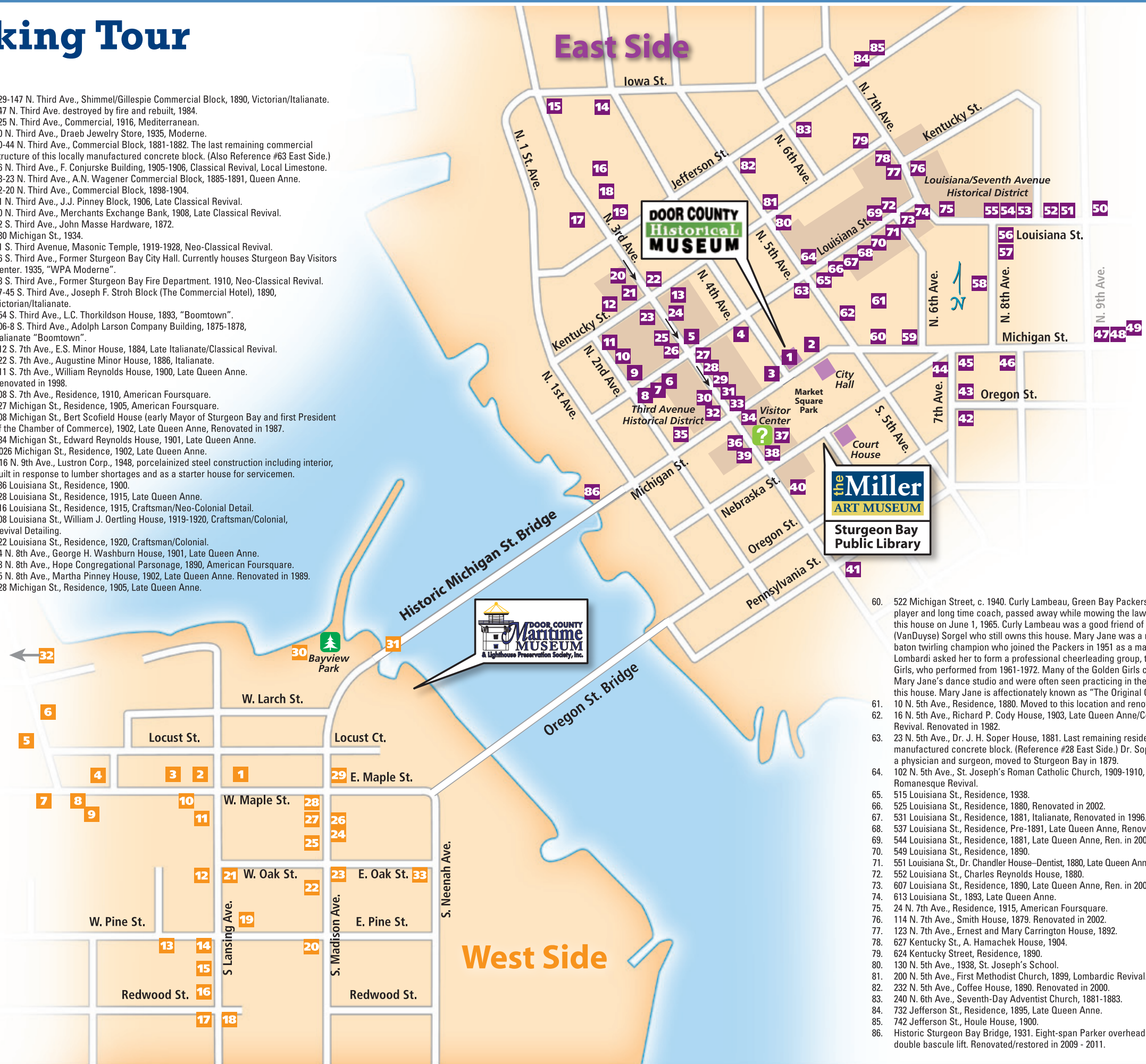

- 239 N. Third Ave., Donna Theater/Third Avenue Playhouse (TAP), Remodeled in 1951, converted to TAP in 2000.
- 211 N. Third Ave., Scofield Hardware Company, 1889.
- Historic Bell Tower; bell cast in 1900. A modern rendition of Baylake Bank's original tower was dedicated January 26, 1990. Built on the NE corner of Third Ave. and Kentucky, this new tower commemorates the Bank's 100th Anniversary. The original tower was erected in 1900 on the NW corner of the same intersection and removed in 1939. The original bell was reacquired with the cooperation of the First Baptist Church of Sturgeon Bay where it had called parishioners to worship since 1946.
- 163 N. Third Ave., Hay Hardware Store, 1889, Neo-Classical Revival.
- 148-154 N. Third Ave., M. F. LaPlant Commercial Block, 1890, Victorian/Italianate/Gothic.

- 522 Michigan Street, c. 1940. Curly Lambeau, Green Bay Packers founder, player and long time coach, passed away while mowing the lawn in front of this house on June 1, 1965. Curly Lambeau was a good friend of Mary Jane (VanDuyse) Sorgel who still owns this house. Mary Jane was a national baton twirling champion who joined the Packers in 1951 as a majorette. Vince Lombardi asked her to form a professional cheerleading group, the Golden Girls, who performed from 1961-1972. Many of the Golden Girls came from Mary Jane's dance studio and were often seen practicing in the front yard of this house. Mary Jane is affectionately known as "The Original Golden Girl."

- 23 N. 5th Ave., Dr. J. H. Soper House, 1881. Last remaining residence of locally manufactured concrete block. (Reference #28 East Side.) Dr. Soper, a physician and surgeon, moved to Sturgeon Bay in 1879.
